Notes for Worship Preparations

- For the worship preparation, prepare a regular size cross, with stand and make sure it is sturdy, at both sides have the standee free hands with broken chain or rope to symbolize freedom.
- In cases the standee hands aren't available, a cross with a dove on freeing position will be a good replacement. (make sure it is visually captivating the message of freedom)

Materials:

• Regular size Cross, standee Hands and a cut out Dove Styrofoam ¼ size.

Symbols to be used for the worship:

- **Communion Table-** The communion table serves as a reminder of the unity of all believers in Christ. In partaking of the bread and wine, Christians symbolically affirm their shared faith in Jesus as the Savior. It signifies that all believers, regardless of their backgrounds, are part of the body of Christ. It represents Christ's sacrifice, unity among believers, spiritual nourishment, the new covenant, anticipation of the kingdom, personal examination, and a call to sacrificial living.
- **Christ's Candle** Jesus Christ is often referred to as the "Light of the World." This symbolism of the lighting of the Christ's Candle is derived from passages such as John 8:12, where Jesus declares, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." The candle can represent Christ's presence and guidance within the Church, illuminating the path of faith and unity.
- **Bible-** The Bible serves as a guide and foundation for the sustenance of unity within the Church and the embrace of its identity. Its teachings on unity, love, covenant, diversity, and the Church's relationship with Christ all contribute to fostering a sense of belonging and purpose among believers.
- **Cross** -The cross is a central symbol of Christianity, signifying Christ's sacrifice for humanity's salvation. The cross emphasizes the unity of believers under the banner of Christ's sacrificial love. It signifies a shared identity rooted in the Gospel message and encourages believers to embrace their roles as part of the body of Christ.

• **Baptismal Font-** The baptismal font serves as a physical reminder of this transformative experience, encouraging believers to embrace their identity as redeemed and renewed individuals within the larger family of God. Its presence and significance remind believers of their shared journey, common identity in Christ, and the call to embrace unity while celebrating the diversity that enriches the body of believers.

REFLECTION

Text: Mark 3:20-35

Freedom Sunday is a special day where we celebrate the freedom we have in Christ and reflect on how we can stand against injustice and oppression within the community.

Mark 3:20-35 depicts a series of encounters Jesus had, illustrating the tension between freedom and societal norms or expectations. In this passage, Jesus faces opposition from both his own family and religious leaders. They accuse him of being possessed by demons and of blasphemy for claiming authority over demons. However, Jesus responds by emphasizing a broader understanding of family and identity, suggesting that those who do the will of God are his true family. This challenges traditional familial ties and societal structures, emphasizing the freedom found in following God's will rather than conforming to societal expectations.

This passage reminds us that even when faced with challenges, we can trust in God's strength and truth. Jesus challenges the oppressive systems of his time and teaches us the importance of standing up for what is right, even if it means going against the norms of society.

REFLECTION

Text: Genesis 3:6-15

Genesis 3:6-15 describes a vital moment in the Bible where Adam and Eve disobey God by eating the forbidden fruit. This act leads to their realization of their nakedness, feelings of shame, and eventual separation from God. Reflecting on this passage on the third Sunday after Pentecost, we are reminded of the seriousness of sin and the importance of repentance. This story highlights the beginning of human struggles and the need for God's grace and redemption, which is fully realized in Jesus Christ.

Historically, Genesis 3:6-15 has been seen as the account of the fall of humanity. It explains the origin of sin and the brokenness of the world, marking the start of humanity's need for salvation. Understanding this background helps us grasp the gravity of sin and the incredible gift of God's forgiveness and redemption. On Father's Sunday, this context encourages fathers to strive towards godliness and to lead their families with wisdom and love, reflecting the redemption offered through Christ.

Father's Sunday provides an opportunity to reflect on the crucial role fathers play in the church, family, and community. *First, fathers are called to be protectors*. This means they have the responsibility to keep their families safe from harm. Just as Adam was supposed to protect and guide his family in the Garden of Eden, fathers today are expected to watch over their families. This protection isn't just physical safety but also involves guarding their loved ones from negative influences and harmful situations. It includes ensuring that their home is a place where everyone feels safe and secure, emotionally, and spiritually.

Second, fathers are leaders, responsible for setting a godly example and guiding their families in faith. Being a leader means setting a good example for everyone to follow. In a Christian context, this means living out their faith in everyday life. Fathers should be role models of honesty, kindness, and faithfulness. They should lead by showing how to pray, read the Bible, and trust in God. A father's actions and decisions should reflect Christian values, guiding their family toward a closer relationship with God. By leading with integrity and faith, they help their families grow stronger in their faith journey.

Lastly, fathers are nurturers, tasked with providing emotional and spiritual support to their children and spouses. A nurturing father listens to his family's concerns, offers comfort and encouragement,

and helps them through tough times. He is there to share in their joys and sorrows, fostering a loving and supportive environment. Spiritually, a nurturing father prays for and with his family, teaches them about God's love, and encourages them to develop their faith. By nurturing their family's emotional and spiritual well-being, fathers help their loved ones feel valued and cared for, building a strong, faith-filled family unit. By fulfilling these roles, fathers can help their families grow in love and faith, and progress a strong and supportive community.

When a Christian father faithfully fulfills his role as protector, leader, and nurturer, he deserves deep respect, gratitude, and love from his family and community. His hard work and dedication create a strong, loving home where everyone feels safe and valued. This respect and appreciation are shown in the everyday acts of love from his children and spouse, as well as special times like Father's Day.

Practically, his efforts result in strong family bonds and a supportive home environment. His children grow up feeling secure and loved, learning valuable life lessons from his example. This nurturing and guidance help them become confident, caring, and faith-filled individuals.

Theologically, a faithful Christian father is promised blessings from God. By leading his family in faith and living according to God's principles, he leaves a lasting spiritual legacy that influences future generations. He experiences the joy and fulfillment of seeing his family thrive and knowing he has made a significant impact. Moreover, he can look forward to God's eternal rewards for his faithfulness and dedication.

- **Liturgist:** We confess, O Lord, that at times we have failed in our relationship with You. We have allowed distractions and worldly desires to come between us, neglecting our spiritual growth and failing to prioritize communion with You.
- **People:** Forgive us, O God, for our lack of devotion and for seeking fulfillment in places other than Your presence.
- Liturgist: We recognize the disharmony in our relationships with the rest of creation. We have exploited and abused the earth, forgetting our responsibility as stewards of Your creation. - Liturgist: Furthermore, we confess, O Lord, that pride and stubbornness often drive a wedge between fathers and their children. Fathers, in their authority, may sometimes exercise control with harshness, failing to extend the grace and understanding that You, our divine Father, offer to us. Likewise, children may rebel against their fathers, resisting their guidance and seeking independence without regard for the wisdom and experience their fathers possess.
- **People:** Forgive us, O God, for the lack of communication and understanding that often characterizes these relationships. We repent of the hurts we have caused one another through words spoken in anger and actions driven by selfishness. Help us to embrace humility and understanding, seeking reconciliation and restoration in our familial bonds.
- All. Grant us, O Lord, the grace to embody Your love and grace within our families. We pray that fathers emulate Your nurturing and protective care, guiding their children with gentleness and wisdom. May children honor their fathers with respect and obedience, recognizing the authority You have entrusted to them. We confess in Jesus' Name. Amen.

Notes for Worship Preparation

Materials

• Standee 3D symbol of Gender Justice

Symbols to be used for the worship:

- **Communion Table-** The communion table serves as a reminder of the unity of all believers in Christ. In partaking of the bread and wine, Christians symbolically affirm their shared faith in Jesus as the Savior. It signifies that all believers, regardless of their backgrounds, are part of the body of Christ. It represents Christ's sacrifice, unity among believers, spiritual nourishment, the new covenant, anticipation of the kingdom, personal examination, and a call to sacrificial living.
- **Christ's Candle** Jesus Christ is often referred to as the "Light of the World." This symbolism of the lighting of the Christ's Candle is derived from passages such as John 8:12, where Jesus declares, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." The candle can represent Christ's presence and guidance within the Church, illuminating the path of faith and unity.
- **Bible-** The Bible serves as a guide and foundation for the sustenance of unity within the Church and the embrace of its identity. Its teachings on unity, love, covenant, diversity, and the Church's relationship with Christ all contribute to fostering a sense of belonging and purpose among believers.
- Cross -The cross is a central symbol of Christianity, signifying Christ's sacrifice for humanity's salvation. The cross emphasizes the unity of believers under the banner of Christ's sacrificial love. It signifies a shared identity rooted in the Gospel message and encourages believers to embrace their roles as part of the body of Christ.
- **Baptismal Font-** The baptismal font serves as a physical reminder of this transformative experience, encouraging believers to embrace their identity as redeemed and renewed individuals within the larger family of God. Its presence and significance remind believers of their shared journey, common identity in Christ, and the call to embrace unity while celebrating the diversity that enriches the body of believers.

REFLECTION

Text: 2 Corinthians 6:1-13

I. Introduction and Background of the Text

Paul had a close but complicated relationship with the Corinthians. He had founded the church in Corinth and spent a significant amount of time there. However, after he left, various issues arose, including challenges to his authority and divisions within the church. Paul wrote 2 Corinthians to address these issues, defend his ministry, and encourage the believers to stay faithful to the teachings of Jesus. This letter is more personal and emotional compared to his other letters, reflecting his deep concern for the Corinthians.

In this part of the letter of 2 Corinthians 6:1-13, Paul is urging the Corinthians not to take God's grace for granted and to live in a way that reflects their faith. He wants them to understand the seriousness of their commitment to God and to reject any behavior that would undermine their faith or the community.

Reflecting on 2 Corinthians 6:1-13 through the lens of gender justice and inclusivity, especially in light of our Church- the United Church of Christ in the Philippines' (UCCP) statement "Let Grace Be Total" (LGBTQ), we find a powerful message about the all-embracing nature of God's grace and the call for justice and love for all people, regardless of gender or sexual orientation.

II. Key Points of Reflection

1. God's Grace for All

Paul's message in this passage is clear, God's grace is a gift that should not be taken lightly. It is meant for everyone, and we are all called to live in a way that honors this grace. In the context of gender justice, this means recognizing that every person, regardless of their gender identity or sexual orientation, is a recipient of God's grace.

The UCCP's "Let Grace Be Total" emphasizes this inclusive understanding, affirming that God's grace does not exclude anyone. This aligns with Paul's plea to not receive God's grace in vain (2 Corinthians 6:1).

2. Endurance and Integrity

Paul speaks about the hardships faced in the ministry and the need to endure these with integrity and love. For many LGBTQI+ individuals, enduring hardship is a familiar experience, for they often face discrimination and exclusion.

The church is called to stand in solidarity with all who face such challenges, advocating their rights and dignity. This endurance should be coupled with a commitment to justice and equality, reflecting the purity, knowledge, and sincere love Paul talks about (2 Corinthians 6:6).

3. Open Hearts

Paul's appeal for mutual openness and affection (2 Corinthians 6:11-13) speaks deeply with the call for an inclusive and loving community. Gender justice involves creating spaces where

everyone can open their hearts without fear of rejection or prejudice.

The church should be a place where all individuals, including those from the LGBTQ community, feel welcomed and loved. This openness is a testament to living out the fullness of God's grace.

III. Applying This to Church and Community

• Inclusivity in Practice

Churches and communities should actively ensure that their practices, policies, and language are inclusive. This means not only welcoming LGBTQ individuals but also advocating for their rights and addressing any form of discrimination or injustice they might face. Practical steps can include revising church policies to be inclusive, providing education on gender justice, and creating support groups for LGBTQ members.

• Education and Awareness

Educating the community about gender justice and the importance of inclusivity is crucial. This can involve workshops, sermons, and open discussions that emphasize the message of God's all-encompassing grace. Highlighting stories and testimonies of LGBTQ individuals can also foster empathy and understanding.

• Advocacy and Action

Reflecting Paul's commitment to integrity and endurance, churches can take a proactive role in advocating for gender justice in broader society. This could mean supporting legislation that protects the rights of LGBTQ individuals and partnering with organizations that promote gender equality. Advocacy is not just about words but also about tangible actions that demonstrate the church's commitment to justice and love.

IV. Conclusion

In reflecting 2 Corinthians 6:1-13 with a focus on gender justice, we see a call to embrace God's grace in its totality, recognizing it as a gift meant for all people. This involves enduring our commitment to justice, opening our hearts to all, and actively creating an inclusive community. By living out these principles, we honor the message of Paul and the inclusive vision of the UCCP, truly making grace total for everyone.

Symbols to be used for the worship:

- **Communion Table** The communion table serves as a reminder of the unity of all believers in Christ. In partaking of the bread and wine, Christians symbolically affirm their shared faith in Jesus as the Savior. It signifies that all believers, regardless of their backgrounds, are part of the body of Christ. It represents Christ's sacrifice, unity among believers, spiritual nourishment, the new covenant, anticipation of the kingdom, personal examination, and a call to sacrificial living.
- **Christ's Candle** Jesus Christ is often referred to as the "Light of the World." This symbolism of the lighting of the Christ's Candle is derived from passages such as John 8:12, where Jesus declares, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." The candle can represent Christ's presence and guidance within the Church, illuminating the path of faith and unity.
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- Cross -The cross is a central symbol of Christianity, signifying Christ's sacrifice for humanity's salvation. The cross emphasizes the unity of believers under the banner of Christ's sacrificial love. It signifies a shared identity rooted in the Gospel message and encourages believers to embrace their roles as part of the body of Christ.
- **Baptismal Font-** The baptismal font serves as a physical reminder of this transformative experience, encouraging believers to embrace their identity as redeemed and renewed individuals within the larger family of God. Its presence and significance remind believers of

their shared journey, common identity in Christ, and the call to embrace unity while celebrating the diversity that enriches the body of believers.

REFLECTION

Text: Mark 5:21-43

Mark 5:21-43 narrates two intertwined stories of healing by Jesus. The first is about Jairus, a synagogue leader, who pleads with Jesus to heal his dying daughter. The second story involves a woman who has been suffering from a bleeding disorder for twelve years. Both stories showcase Jesus's compassion and miraculous power.

The context of the story happened after Jesus has just returned from the region of the Gerasenes, also known as the Gerasenes' territory, which was located on the eastern side of the Sea of Galilee. It is part of the Decapolis, a group of ten cities with a significant Greco-Roman cultural influence, where he healed a demon-possessed man. As he arrives back on the other side of the lake, a large crowd gathers around Him. Jairus, a respected synagogue leader, falls at Jesus's feet, begging Him to heal his critically-ill daughter (verses 21-24). Jesus agrees to go with Jairus, and a large crowd follows.

As Jesus is on His way to Jairus's house, a woman suffering from a chronic bleeding condition for twelve years touches His cloak, believing it will heal her (verses 25-34). Her condition was more than just a physical ailment; it deeply affected every aspect of her life. Physically, she had been bleeding continuously, which would have left her weak and in constant discomfort. Spiritually, according to Jewish law, her bleeding made her ritually unclean. This meant she couldn't participate in religious activities or worship at the temple. Emotionally, after twelve years of suffering, she likely felt hopeless and desperate. She had spent all her money on doctors, but none had been able to help her. Socially, being considered unclean meant she was isolated from her community, including her family who would have taken care of her condition. People would avoid touching her, and she would have been excluded from social gatherings and normal daily interactions.

When she touched Jesus's cloak, she did so with great faith, believing that even this small act could heal her. Her story highlights her courage and faith despite her long-term suffering and social isolation.

While Jesus is speaking to the woman, people come from Jairus's house to inform him that his daughter has died and suggest there's no need to bother Jesus anymore. Jesus overhears and tells Jairus not to fear, but to believe. Jesus takes only Peter, James, and John with Him to Jairus's house. On arrival, they

find people mourning the girl's death. Jesus tells them she is not dead but sleeping, and they laugh at Him. He takes the girl's parents and His disciples into the room where the girl is lying, takes her by the hand, and says, "Talitha koum," which means, "Little girl, I say to you, get up!" The girl immediately gets up and begins walking around, astonishing everyone. Jesus instructs them to give her something to eat and tells them not to tell anyone about this miracle (verses 35-43).

Jairus was a respected leader in the synagogue, a position that gave him significant religious and social standing in his community. As a synagogue leader, he was responsible for organizing worship, teaching, and maintaining the synagogue.

The act of pleading for help from Jesus, who had a questionable reputation among Jewish leaders at the time, could have negatively impacted him. Approaching Jesus, a controversial figure among many Jewish leaders, was a bold move. Jairus risked his reputation and position by publicly seeking Jesus's help. His plea showed his desperation as a father and his faith in Jesus's ability to heal, prioritizing his daughter's life over potential criticism. Furthermore, by aligning himself with Jesus, Jairus could have faced condemnation or barring from other religious leaders and members of the synagogue who opposed Jesus.

Despite these risks, Jairus's actions demonstrated his deep love for his daughter and his belief in Jesus's power to heal. His story highlights the impact of personal crisis on faith and social dynamics.

The lessons from the two stories in Mark 5:21-43 are that both Jairus and the woman exhibit deep faith in Jesus's power to heal, despite their desperate situations. Jesus shows compassion by responding to both Jairus's and the woman's needs. He has authority over illness and death. Indeed, Jesus's healing of the ritually unclean woman and the young girl demonstrates that His ministry is for everyone, regardless of social or religious barriers.

This passage encourages us to approach Jesus with faith and trust, even in our most desperate times. It also reminds us of the inclusive and compassionate nature of Jesus's ministry, calling us to be instruments of His healing and hope in our communities.

As we reflect on this passage, let's consider the work and ministry of Jesus through our Church, the United Church of Christ in the Philippines (UCCP). Much like Jesus's ministry of healing and restoration, our Church is committed to rebuilding and restoring communities with hope. Through diverse programs- whether providing disaster relief, supporting marginalized communities, or advocating for social justice-the UCCP embodies the spirit of Jesus's healing touch in today's world.

In our daily lives, we are called to be agents of hope and restoration. Just as Jesus responded to the desperate pleas of Jairus and the suffering woman, we are called to listen to and act on the needs of those around us. Our efforts, no matter how small, contribute to the greater work of God's people.

So, let us be inspired by these stories from Mark and the impactful work of the UCCP. Let us embrace our role in heralding hope and actively participate in the mission of rebuilding and restoring our communities as the people of God. Through faith and action, we continue the work of Christ, bringing healing and new life to those in need.
